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1 Introduction

1.1 Who is CEER?

The Council of European Energy Regulators (CEER) is the European association of energy national regulatory authorities (NRAs). CEER supports the important work of NRAs to foster a sound European regulatory framework. CEER does this by developing good practices in energy regulation and sharing experience including through training, workshops and international collaboration with other regulatory bodies within and outside of Europe. CEER champions the development of competitive and innovative markets in the public interest through robust, independent regulation. 1.2 CEER as a valued partner

CEER cooperates closely with the EU Agency for the Cooperation of Energy Regulators (ACER), and our respective work complements and strengthens one another's roles. ACER has a legislative mandate and responsibilities related to the cross-border regulatory framework for the effective operation of Europe's Internal Energy Market (IEM). CEER's scope of activities and its membership consist of the regulators from the EU and EEA Member States, and has 8 European NRAs as Observers.

CEER (as a voluntary association) has the freedom to develop bold, forward-looking European visions and solutions in the public interest. CEER is on the frontline of delivering the IEM in important areas where ACER does not have the resources or a mandate, and in respect of implementing and enforcing EU-wide rules nationally. The experiences shared and nourished within CEER help inform the policy cycle and ultimately help Europe's energy NRAs and ACER in working on behalf of the energy consumer.

CEER will continue to be active in supporting the European institutions to further develop and implement measures to enhance the IEM. We anticipate that the CEER work programme for 2019 will need to be adapted to take account of these expected developments, for example in relation to the Clean Energy legislative proposals once they are adopted.



2 CEER's 3D Strategy (2019 - 2021)

Each year CEER publicly consults on its work programme for the year ahead. In 2018 CEER consulted not only on the draft 2019 work programme but also on the key trends and drivers which energy regulators need to factor into the development of regulatory frameworks over the coming 3 years. CEER thanks the 21 respondents, from a variety of organisations, who provided their valuable views which have helped inform CEER's 3D Strategy and 2019 Work Programme. The result is CEER's 3D Strategy for the period 2019-2021, and this present document (the 2019 Work Programme) to implement the first year of this 3-year strategy. The non-confidential responses received, the Evaluation of Responses and the "3D Strategy" are published on the CEER website.

In brief, the core elements of CEER's 3D strategy for the period 2019-2021 are:

- Digitalisation in the consumer interest (D1)
- Decarbonisation at least cost (D2) and
- Dynamic regulation-European solutions for adaptive regulation in a fast-changing world (D3).

As regulators' primary concern is with protecting the interests of European consumers, consumers are at the very core of <u>CEER's 3D Strategy</u>.

2.1 Digitalisation in the consumer interest

Digitalisation is driving changes for the whole economy, including the energy sector. In setting digitalisation as a strategy policy area (D1), regulators seek to enable digitalisation in the consumer interest. The CEER's digitalisation public consultation paper (foreseen for March 2019) will look at what digitalisation means for consumers and the role of regulators to enable digitalisation of the energy system in a positive way for the consumer. This is likely to lead to follow on work in 2020 and beyond.

2.2 Decarbonisation at least cost

The climate agenda and "Clean Energy" objectives are major policy drivers for change in the energy sector. Importantly, CEER's decarbonisation policy priority area is about decarbonisation at least cost (and not decarbonisation per se). Cost-efficient decarbonisation of the energy sector needs a cross-sectoral (electricity and gas) and whole system approach, keeping in mind all aspects: wholesale, networks, retail and potential impacts on infrastructure development. It also needs to factor in impacts on the electricity and gas sector from decarbonisation of mobility and building sectors (green mobility, efficiency etc.).

2.3 Dynamic regulation

CEER sees that regulation must be stable, but not static. Regulation must adapt to market evolutions, including a growing diversity and number of participants. Europe's energy regulators are determined to make regulation coherent with the fast-changing environment that digitalisation and decarbonisation bring about, whilst continuing to protect the European energy consumers' interests effectively.



Dynamic regulation refers to:

- full and coherent implementation in practice of the legislative and regulatory framework in the European Union;
- an appropriate oversight to ensure trust in the market; and
- a strong link between the evolution of the energy sector and regulatory implementation by developing future-proofed European solutions.
- An adaptive regulation, inciting regulators to evolve, to be open to innovation, and to
 work on enhancements to their regulatory frameworks, while pursuing reasonable
 stability, in order to ensure predictability for market players and readability for
 consumers.

3 CEER work areas in 2019

This CEER 2019 Work Programme comprises 17 public deliverables. These are developed from the 3D Strategy: Digitalisation in the consumer interest; decarbonisation at least cost; and dynamic regulation. As the association of energy NRAs, CEER will continue to assist NRAs enhance their capability to fulfil their individual responsibilities to implement a competitive, sustainable and secure energy market in Europe. There will be many workshops, events and training courses. A central initiative during 2019 will be on dynamic regulation to enable the digitalisation of the energy system in the consumer's interest. We will continue to promote competitive retail markets. CEER will also deepen its examination of how the role of DSOs is changing in the face of continuing legal and technical developments. We will consider further how the regulatory framework should evolve dynamically to keep pace with those changes. We will monitor developments in cyber security. We will continue our international relations with regulators internationally to exchange experiences and to respond to the growing interaction between the European internal energy market and its neighbouring markets.

3.1 Consumers in an increasingly digital world and retail markets

Consumers and retail markets will be an ongoing priority in 2019 (and beyond). We will examine how dynamic regulation can further support the needs of consumers including making recommendations on the consumer impacts of dynamic price implementation. Monitoring consumer protection and retail markets will continue to be a major focus of our work. CEER's priorities for 2019 emphasise that energy customers have an increasing level of active involvement in energy markets. We remain committed to enabling consumers to engage more effectively in energy markets and in energy regulation issues.

We will encourage retail market competition and foster appropriate levels of consumer protection and empowerment in an evolving European market. We will work with our members so that they can identify the gaps in their own markets for well-functioning retail energy markets, so that customers experience a better market by 2025. CEER will continue to develop the Partnership for the Enforcement of European Rights (PEER), a CEER-led initiative which has become an established cross-sectoral and cross-authority form of cooperation at European level. We will look at what digitalisation means for consumers and what is the role of regulators to enable digitalisation of the energy system in a positive way for the consumer. We will work actively in support of the European institutions in the development of smart grids as well as in other areas. CEER is also developing guidelines for bundled products.



3.2 New legislative/policy developments

CEER will interact with, and give input to, the European Institutions in particular in relation to the development and implementation of the Clean Energy for all Europeans legislation and the New Deal for Consumers. CEER remains committed to working with and advising the European Commission on regulatory aspects in a range of areas, including wholesale and retail markets, smart grids and consumer rights.

3.3 The role of Distribution System Operators

Examining the changing role of DSOs will remain a priority for 2019. We will seek to anticipate current retail and wholesale market developments, notably in relation to digitalisation and decarbonisation. Other important issues to be addressed include network tariffs and developing a whole system approach to incentives schemes. Flexibility is a cross-cutting issue that needs to be considered with regards to both markets and networks. In 2019, CEER will make proposals for arrangements to ensure the efficient procurement of flexibility taking account of interactions between DSOs and TSOs.

3.4 Gas and electricity market developments

CEER will report on the effect renewables generation is having on future investment signals. We will produce our annual report on the regulatory frameworks (for investment conditions) of European energy networks, looking at the regulatory regimes and analysing how the cost of capital is determined. CEER will examine the role of regulation in innovation, the role of gas networks and the interaction between gas and electricity networks as the energy system moves towards decarbonisation. We will benchmark power losses. In preparation for the 2020 update of the benchmarking report on quality of electricity and gas supply, CEER will work on the harmonisation of indicators.

3.5 International work beyond the borders of the EU

CEER remains committed to holding a constructive dialogue with international partners, particularly near neighbours, and supports the European Commission and the EU's external priorities. CEERs international work in 2019 will focus on:

- Pro-actively engaging regulators in countries neighbouring the EU;
- Promoting and supporting energy security;
- Engaging non-regulatory energy authorities in order to exchange expertise on good regulatory practices; and
- Monitoring and engaging in developments that could impact on EU NRAs.

3.6 Other work areas

CEER will undertake important monitoring work across a range of areas and will work with ACER on the development and implementation of the European regulatory framework in both gas and electricity.
